STATEMENT OF WORK

1. INTRODUCTION:

The U.S. District Court of Eastern District of Pennsylvania is seeking to renovate Courtroom 13B Ancillary areas which includes 2 Conference rooms, Bailiff area, Jury room, Jury room bathrooms and Courtroom Deputy office. The scope of work includes the install of carpet tiles, vinyl cove base floor polishing and painting. The contractor shall provide a written quotation of the work to be performed, verify all measurements, and provide all necessary materials. All work is to be completed during non-business hours.

2. SCOPE:

Task 1: Courtroom 13B 2 conference Rooms

Contractor shall provide pricing to prep, paint all walls, remove existing cove base, and install new vinyl cove base for 2 conference rooms. Pricing shall include patchwork of any holes on walls, included but not limited to replacement of door stoppers. Contractor is responsible for verifying all measurements, totals, and designated work areas.

1A: Preparation of Walls and Painting – 13B Attorney Conference Room

The contractor shall provide pricing to prepare and paint all walls approx. 477 sq. ft for Courtroom 13B Attorney conference room during non-business hours. **Contractor shall verify all measurements.** This includes but is not limited to skim coating and repairing of any holes on the walls. Pricing shall include but not limited removal of all nails and screws prior to painting. All walls shall be painted with one coat of primer and 2 coats of low voc paint of Benjamin Moore or comparable. Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

1B: Preparation of Walls and Painting – 13B Witness Room

The contractor shall provide pricing to prepare and paint all walls approx. 370 sq. ft for Courtroom 13B Attorney conference room during non-business hours. **Contractor shall verify all measurements.** This includes but is not limited to skim coating and repairing of any holes on the walls. Pricing shall include but not limited removal of all nails and screws prior to painting. All walls shall be painted with one coat of primer and 2 coats of low voc paint of Benjamin Moore or comparable. Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

1C: Removal, Furnish and Installation of Cove Base

Contractor shall provide pricing for removal of existing 98 linear feet of cove base. Price shall include furnishing and installation of a new straight vinyl cove base during non-business hours. (No toe) **Contractor shall verify all measurements.** Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

Task 2: Courtroom 13B Jury Room Renovation

Contractor shall provide pricing to prep, paint all walls of jury room and ceilings of restrooms, removal of existing cove base and install new vinyl cove base, and installation of new carpet. Pricing shall include patchwork of any holes on walls, included but not limited to replacement of door stoppers. **Contractor is responsible for verifying all measurements, totals, and designated work areas.**

2A: Preparation of Walls and Painting

The contractor shall provide pricing to prepare and paint all walls of 739 sq. ft during non-business hours. **Contractor shall verify all measurements.** This includes but is not limited to skim coating and repairing of any holes on the walls. Preparation work shall include but not limited removal of all nails and screws prior to painting. All walls shall be painted with one coat of primer and 2 coats of low voc paint of Benjamin Moore or comparable. Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

2B: Preparation and Painting of 2 restrooms ceilings

The contractor shall provide pricing on preparation and painting of 90 sq. ft ceilings for 2 restrooms during non-business hours. **Contractor shall verify all measurements.** Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

2C: Removal, Furnish and Installation of Cove Base

Contractor shall provide pricing for removal, furnishing and installation of 84 linear feet of vinyl cove base during non-business hours. **Contractor shall verify all measurements.** Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

2D: Installation of Carpet Tiles

The contractor shall provide pricing on installation 50 sq. yd of carpet tile during non-business hours. **Contractor shall verify all measurements.** Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

Task 3: Courtroom 13B Deputy Office Renovation

Contractor shall provide pricing to prep, paint all walls, removal of existing cove base install new vinyl cove base and installation of new carpet for deputy office. Pricing shall include patchwork of any holes on walls, included but not limited to replacement of door stoppers. **Contractor is responsible for verifying all measurements, totals, and designated work areas.**

3A: Preparation of Walls and Painting

The contractor shall provide pricing to prepare all walls of 625 sq. ft for painting in the Deputy office during non-business hours. This includes but is not limited to skim coating and repairing of any holes on the walls. Preparation work shall include but not limited removal of all nails and screws prior to painting. All walls shall be painted with one coat of primer and 2 coats of low voc paint of Benjamin Moore or comparable. **Contractor shall verify all measurements.** Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

3B: Removal, Furnish and Installation of Cove Base

Contractor shall provide pricing for removal, furnishing and installation of 69 linear feet of vinyl cove base in the Deputy office during non-business hours. **Contractor shall verify all measurements.** Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

3C: Installation of Carpet Tiles

The contractor shall provide pricing on furnishing and installation 28 sq. yd of carpet tile in the Deputy office during non-business hours. **Contractor shall verify all measurements.** Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

Task 4: Courtroom 13B Bailiff Area Renovation

Contractor shall provide pricing to prep, paint all walls and ceilings of restrooms, removal of existing cove base and install new vinyl cove base. Pricing shall include patchwork of any holes on walls, included but not limited to replacement of door stoppers. **Contractor is responsible for verifying all measurements, totals, and designated work areas.**

4A: Preparation of Walls and Painting

The contractor shall provide pricing to prepare all walls of 475 sq. ft for painting in the bailiff area during non-business hours. This includes but is not limited to skim coating and repairing of any holes on the walls. Preparation work shall include but not limited removal of all nails and screws prior to painting. All walls shall be painted with one coat of primer and 2 coats of low voc paint of Benjamin Moore or comparable. **Contractor shall verify all measurements.** Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

4B: Preparation and Painting of 2 restrooms ceilings

The contractor shall provide pricing on preparation and painting of 60 sq. ft ceilings of 2 restrooms in the bailiff area during non-business hours. **Contractor shall verify all measurements.** Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

4C: Removal, Furnish and Installation of Cove Base

Contractor shall provide pricing for removal, furnishing and installation of 60 linear feet of vinyl cove base in the bailiff area during non-business hours. **Contractor shall verify all measurements.** Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

Task 5: Painting of Door Jams

The contractor shall provide pricing for painting on both side of 10 door jams of the designated area of Courtroom 13B conference rooms, jury room, deputy office and bailiff area. **Contractor shall verify all totals and designated work areas.** Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job. All work shall be completed during non-business hours.

Task 6: Outlet Covers

Contractor shall remove and replace all switch and outlet covers. Pricing shall include all materials and supplies necessary to complete the job.

Task 7: Furniture/Artwork Removal and Relocation

Contractor shall remove all furniture, artwork, clocks and etc on walls to ensure no damages and complete coverage of paint job. Pricing shall include relocation of all furniture and artwork as needed. All work shall be completed during non-business hours.

Task 8: Materials & Supplies

Contractor shall provide pricing for all materials and supplies necessary to complete the above task.

Task 9: Trash/Debris Removal and Clean Up

Contractor shall provide pricing for removal of all trash and debris from the work site and courthouse. Pricing should include cleaning all work surfaces that have accumulated dust during the project.

Contractor shall provide pricing to polish conference room and bailiff area floors. Contractor shall verify all measurements.

Task 1C, 2C, 3B, 4C: Ensure the cove base is properly installed on the walls with no invisible gaps and it is evenly installed to the walls.

Task 2D, 3C: Carpet tiles are glued and leveled on the floor evenly and covered the area without any visible gaps or lines.

FOOTNOTE:

a. PAID HOLIDAYS: Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and five personal holidays provided employee works at least one day in the three work days before and at least one day in the three work days after the said holiday. Employee earns a personal holiday every two months, provided employee has worked twenty-six day in each consecutive two month period, up to a maximum of five per calendar year. After 130 work days the employee is entitled to all five personal holidays.

b. PAID VACATION: Employee will earn one vacation day for every two months, provided employee has worked twenty-six day in each consecutive two month period, up to a maximum of five vacation days per calendar year. After 130 workdays the employee is entitled to all five days of vacation. Employees with 5 years of seniority, earn an additional week of vacation, accrued in the same way.

WELDERS - Receive rate prescribed for craft performing operation to which welding is incidental.

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Note: Executive Order (EO) 13706, Establishing Paid Sick Leave for Federal Contractors applies to all contracts subject to the Davis-Bacon Act for which the contract is awarded (and any solicitation was issued) on or after January 1, 2017. If this contract is covered by the EO, the contractor must provide employees with 1 hour of paid sick leave for every 30 hours they work, up to 56 hours of paid sick leave each year. Employees must be permitted to use paid sick leave for their own illness, injury or other health-related needs, including preventive care; to assist a family member (or person who is

like family to the employee) who is ill, injured, or has other health-related needs, including preventive care; or for reasons resulting from, or to assist a family member (or person who is like family to the employee) who is a victim of, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking. Unlisted classifications needed for work not included within the scope of the classifications listed may be added after award only as provided in the labor standards contract clauses (29CFR 5.5 (a) (1) (iii)).

The body of each wage determination lists the classification and wage rates that have been found to be prevailing for the cited type(s) of construction in the area covered by the wage determination. The classifications are listed in alphabetical order of ""identifiers"" that indicate whether the particular rate is a union rate (current union negotiated rate for local), a survey rate (weighted average rate) or a union average rate (weighted union average rate).

Union Rate Identifiers

A four letter classification abbreviation identifier enclosed in dotted lines beginning with characters other than ""SU"" or ""UAVG"" denotes that the union classification and rate were prevailing for that classification in the survey. Example: PLUM0198-005 07/01/2014. PLUM is an abbreviation identifier of the union which prevailed in the survey for this classification, which in this example would be Plumbers. 0198 indicates the local union number or district council number where applicable, i.e., Plumbers Local 0198. The next number, 005 in the example, is an internal number used in processing the wage determination. 07/01/2014 is the effective date of the most current negotiated rate, which in this example is July 1, 2014.

Union prevailing wage rates are updated to reflect all rate changes in the collective bargaining agreement (CBA) governing this classification and rate.

Survey Rate Identifiers

Classifications listed under the ""SU"" identifier indicate that no one rate prevailed for this classification in the survey and the published rate is derived by computing a weighted average rate based on all the rates reported in the survey for that classification. As this weighted average rate includes all rates reported in the survey, it may include both union and non-union rates. Example: SULA2012-007 5/13/2014. SU indicates the rates are survey rates based on a weighted average calculation of rates and are not majority rates. LA indicates the State of Louisiana. 2012 is the year of survey on which these classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 5/13/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

Survey wage rates are not updated and remain in effect until a

new survey is conducted.

Union Average Rate Identifiers

Classification(s) listed under the UAVG identifier indicate that no single majority rate prevailed for those classifications; however, 100% of the data reported for the classifications was union data. EXAMPLE: UAVG-OH-0010 08/29/2014. UAVG indicates that the rate is a weighted union average rate. OH indicates the state. The next number, 0010 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 08/29/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

A UAVG rate will be updated once a year, usually in January of each year, to reflect a weighted average of the current negotiated/CBA rate of the union locals from which the rate is based.

State Adopted Rate Identifiers

Classifications listed under the ""SA"" identifier indicate that the prevailing wage rate set by a state (or local) government was adopted under 29 C.F.R. 1.3(g)-(h). Example: SAME2023-007 01/03/2024. SA reflects that the rates are state adopted. ME refers to the State of Maine. 2023 is the year during which the state completed the survey on which the listed classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 01/03/2024 reflects the date on which the classifications and rates under the ?SA? identifier took effect under state law in the state from which the rates were adopted.

----- WAGE DETERMINATION APPEALS PROCESS

1.) Has there been an initial decision in the matter? This can be:

- * an existing published wage determination
- * a survey underlying a wage determination
- * a Wage and Hour Division letter setting forth a position on a wage determination matter
- * a conformance (additional classification and rate) ruling

On survey related matters, initial contact, including requests for summaries of surveys, should be with the Wage and Hour National Office because National Office has responsibility for the Davis-Bacon survey program. If the response from this initial contact is not satisfactory, then the process described in 2.) and 3.) should be followed.

With regard to any other matter not yet ripe for the formal process described here, initial contact should be with the Branch of Construction Wage Determinations. Write to:
